I got an answer to a question on notice SE 13/0192. There are 43 cars apparently on Nauru. As I look at a map of Nauru and—correct me if I am wrong—there are about 30 kilometres of roads there from the immigration department. Why do you need 43 cars? Perhaps you could take some of it on notice but it is interesting to note that in respect of vehicles on Christmas Island you are able to tell me how many kilometres they have travelled and what officer might command the car. In respect of Nauru, you do not seem to be able to tell me very much at all. The information I am seeking is: who are the departmental officers who are assigned each of those 43 cars? What is the policy concerning the use of those cars? What is the cost of maintaining those vehicles? If the vehicles need to be repaired, are they repaired on Nauru or are they shipped back home? These are simple questions that your answer SE13/0192 really failed to provide any information. You have got 43 cars. What are they doing? Who has got them? On 30 kilometres of road.</p> <p>Mr Bowles: On 0192 I cannot see 43 cars mentioned. Is that on there?</p> <p>Senator LUDWIG: I am happy for you to check your record as well, but—</p> <p>Mr Bowles: I can check those numbers. Nauru is a small island, as you rightly say. But we also have a number of operations in there. There are a number of different centres on Nauru and it is just a function of the activities. Some of those vehicles probably will be buses and the like, to move transferees around to different locations. It is not necessarily a function of having only 30 kilometres of road. It is the job that it is there to do. I can take on notice if I can get any more detail about fixing cars, but it could be a combination of bringing a technician in to do certain things at certain times if they break down. According to a recent United Nations report, I understand Afghanistan's opium output is up nearly 50 per cent in the last year. Late last year, Ohio Attorney-General Mike DeWine warned that 'a heroin epidemic' had seized his state, and Russia's director of the federal narcotics service warned that heroin is a 'dragon' that is 'ravaging our youth,' and there is fear that, when allied forces leave Afghanistan or withdraw substantially from Afghanistan, it will become a 'failed narco-state' with an increase in the influence of the Taliban who obtain enormous revenue from heroin production. In terms of risk assessment, is that something that is on the radar of Customs, given that the UN is saying that there has been a massive increase in opium production in Afghanistan? What implications does that have for your service—and I am happy for you to answer it in part and then on notice—and do you think it will pose a challenge to the resources of Customs given what we have seen in other countries? [...] Senator XENOPHON: Is it something that would be a challenge to your resources? The Ohio state Attorney-General is saying that this has become a major issue in his home state. Heroin use rates have skyrocketed in his home state. Is that something that you are concerned about in Australia? Can you tell me, if it is not giving away secrets, what is the policy about looking at containers?</p> <p>Comment on whether that is constrained by resources and comment on my first question, about allegations of huge quantities of contraband—illicit tobacco—sitting on our wharves, rarely seen because they are never looked at because of resources.
