#### **PREFACE**

On 9 May 2007, the Senate referred to the committee the examination of estimates of proposed expenditure for the financial year 2007-08. The committee is responsible for the examination of the Attorney-General's portfolio and the Immigration and Citizenship portfolio. The portfolio budget statements were tabled on 9 May 2007.

#### Reference of proposed expenditures

The Senate referred to the committee, for examination and report, the following documents:

- particulars of certain proposed expenditure in respect of the year ending on 30 June 2008 (relating to Appropriation Bill (No. 2) 2007-08);
- particulars of proposed expenditure in respect of the year ending on 30 June 2008 (relating to Appropriation Bill (No. 1) 2007-08);
- particulars of certain proposed supplementary expenditure in respect of the year ending on 30 June 2007 (relating to Appropriation Bill (No.6) 2006-07); and

The committee was required to report on its consideration of the budget estimates on or before 19 June 2007.

#### **Estimates hearings**

The committee met in public session from 21 May to 24 May 2007.

Over the course of the four days' hearings, totalling over 42 hours, the committee took evidence from the following departments and agencies:

#### **CHAPTER 1**

# IMMIGRATION AND CITIZENSHIP PORTFOLIO

#### Introduction

1.1 This chapter summarises areas of interest and concern raised during the committee's consideration of the budget estimates of the Immigration and Citizenship portfolio for the 2007-08 financial year.

#### **Department of Immigration and Citizenship**

- 1.2 Changes in the output/outcome structure for DIAC are outlined in appendix 4.
- 1.3 The committee received an update on DIAC's projected overspend for the 2006-07 financial year. Officers told the committee that DIAC's overspend would be close to the \$55.4 million approved by the Department of Finance and Administration (DoFA). Officers told the committee that DIAC was working with DoFA to ensure appropriate funding levels in the future to take into account new expenditure, such as the implementation of the Palmer and Comrie reports.<sup>1</sup>
- 1.4 Continuing its examination of DIAC's finances, the committee sought an explanation for the increase in DIAC's employee expenses from \$499 million in 2006-07 to \$522 million in 2007-08. DIAC explained that implementation of the citizenship test and additional checking of temporary long stay (457) visas required increased staff numbers. In addition, pay rises negotiated under DIAC's new enterprise agreement had also increased employee costs.<sup>2</sup>
- 1.5 The committee continued its oversight of DIAC's implementation of the Palmer and Comrie reports, obtaining an update from DIAC on the 247 cases of possible unlawful detention referred to the Ombudsman for investigation. DIAC told the committee that 84 case summaries have been provided to DIAC by the Ombudsman, and DIAC was considering responses to each case.<sup>3</sup> The committee also questioned officers on the progress of the compensation claim of Ms Cornelia Rau. DIAC advised that a statement of claim had been provided by Ms Rau's lawyers and

DIAC was assessing the claim and how to resolve it, including the consideration of whether alternative dispute resolution should be pursue.<sup>4</sup>

- 1.6 In relation to outcome 1, the committee sought information about matters including:
- the recent report by the Auditor-General on the administration of the health requirement under the Migration Act including the lack of monitoring of health undertakings made by people granted visas;<sup>5</sup>
- the review of the policy in relation to HIV positive visa applicants being undertaken at the request of the Prime Minister; 6 and
- waiting periods for contributory parent visa applicants.<sup>7</sup>
- 1.7 The committee questioned DIAC on the Government's arrangements with the United States of America (USA) to accept refugees accommodated at Guantanamo Bay and for the USA to accept refugees accommodated on Nauru. <sup>8</sup> Committee members questioned officers on the negotiation process of the agreement, in particular the timeline of events leading to the agreement. Officers agreed to provide details on notice.
- 1.8 DIAC provided information in relation to the 83 Sri Lankan asylum seekers who were intercepted by the Navy in international waters, taken to Christmas Island for initial screening interviews and ultimately sent to Nauru for processing of their claims for asylum. DIAC updated the committee on the progress of the claims together with an update on the progress of asylum claims of Burmese asylum seekers also on Nauru.<sup>9</sup>
- 1.9 In relation to output 2.1 (settlement services), the committee sought further details on the proposed measures to increase support for recently arrived humanitarian entrants, including in relation to:
- the purpose of a proposed discretionary fund to support the settlement of refugees in regional areas; 10
- the new Proposer Support Program to strengthen the capacity of proposers to support entrants under the Special Humanitarian Program;<sup>11</sup>

- the establishment of Complex Case Support services to deliver specialised and intensive case management to recently arrived humanitarian entrants with exceptional needs (i.e. where pre-migration experiences, severe toture and trauma or crisis events present significant barriers to settlement beyond the capacity of existing services);<sup>12</sup> and
- the proposed Crisis Payment for humanitarian entrants to help address the financial hardship faced by families in their first weeks. 13
- 1.10 The committee examined in detail the proposed citizenship test. Committee members asked officers if samples of the test's 'questions' published in the media were written and released by the government or DIAC. Officers told the committee that the citizenship test questions had not yet been framed, and therefore were not released by the government or DIAC.<sup>14</sup>
- 1.11 Additionally, committee members questioned officers on how the test will operate, examining DIAC on:
- who will administer the test; 15
- costs for applicants; 16 and
- the information booklet to accompany the proposed test. 17

#### Migration Review Tribunal and Refugee Review Tribunal

- 1.12 The committee questioned the Tribunals about:
- cost savings resulting from combining the administration of the Tribunals;<sup>18</sup>
- reductions in staff numbers<sup>19</sup>;
- the new case management system employed by the Tribunals<sup>20</sup>; and
- the composition of the MRT caseload by visa class and factors affecting the composition of the caseload.<sup>21</sup>

- 1.13 The committee sought information on the use of translation services in the RRT and MRT and heard that around 66 percent of MRT cases and 90 percent of RRT cases use translation services. These services are provided in over 90 languages. <sup>22</sup>
- 1.14 The committee sought information on whether training and guidance for RRT members covers sexuality issues relating to refugees. Officers responded that these issues would be considered, particularly in the development of guidance on 'vulnerable persons' to be released later this year. <sup>23</sup>

### **CHAPTER 2**

#### ATTORNEY GENERAL'S

#### **PORTFOLIO**

#### Introduction

2.1 This chapter summarises areas of interest and concern raised during the committee's consideration of the budget estimates for the Attorney-General's portfolio for the 2007-08 financial year.

#### **Australian Commission for Law Enforcement Integrity**

2.2 In its first appearance before the committee, ACLEI provided an overview of its current caseload. Officers told the committee 24 cases had been referred since ACLEI commenced operation on 30 December 2006. Officers also provided the committee with a breakdown on the progress of the cases, who referred them, and a broad outline of the issues involved in each case. The committee acknowledges the work of Professor McMillan in setting up ACLEI, and also looks forward to the appointment of a permanent Commissioner.

#### **Australian Federal Police**

- 2.3 The committee questioned the AFP in relation to matters including:
- recruitment to the AFP's International Deployment Group (IDG)<sup>1</sup>;
- implementation of the recommendations of the *Wheeler Review into Airport Policing and Security* and, in particular, the difficulties state police forces were experiencing providing police for uniformed policing roles at airports<sup>2</sup>; and
- reasons for the delays in the development of the new AFP headquarters at ANZAC Park West.<sup>3</sup>
- 2.4 In response to questioning from the committee, officers advised the committee of progress made in recruiting officers to the AFP's IDG. The committee heard that like state police services, the AFP was experiencing difficulty in recruiting experienced police officers. <sup>4</sup>

2.5 The committee obtained an update on the three AFP investigations into weapons allegedly stolen from the Australian Defence Force (ADF). The AFP advised the committee that since the Additional Estimates round in February no additional cases of missing weapons had been referred to the AFP, and of the cases referred to the AFP, one was currently before the courts. The AFP also advised that in several cases it was working with the ADF to identify how many weapons (if any) had been stolen and their type.<sup>5</sup>

#### **Attorney-General's Department**

- 2.6 Changes in the outcome/output structure for AGD are outlined in appendix 5.
- 2.7 The committee examined the financial position of AGD, seeking detail on the \$13.1 million dollar expected surplus for the 2006-07 financial year. AGD provided the committee with a detailed breakdown of underspends in the department citing a range of factors contributing to the predicted surplus, including difficulty in recruiting staff. The committee also examined current and predicted expenditure of AGD on communication campaigns with officers tabling a document outlining the various campaigns and their costs.
- 2.8 Senators sought details on security arrangements for the 2007 APEC forum. Officers told the committee that the government had allocated \$169.1 million since 2004 for APEC security, with \$78 million dollars of the total figure being provided as a supplementation for the New South Wales police force. With the remainder of the money being allocated to AGD, AFP, ASIO, the Department of Transport and Regional Services (DoTARS), the Department of Defence, and the Australian Customs Service (ACS).<sup>8</sup>
- 2.9 The committee continued its interest from previous estimates rounds in the case of Mr David Hicks. <sup>9</sup> The committee heard a detailed breakdown of the costs involved in bringing Mr David Hicks back to Australia, with officers telling the committee that the charter flight to bring Mr Hicks back to Australia cost \$526,187. Officers explained why it was necessary to charter an aircraft, and the requirements for the aircraft itself which had contributed to the cost. Senators also obtained details on the prisoner transfer agreement between Australia and the United States and its operation.

#### Other agencies and themes

- 2.10 Detailed questioning of departments and agencies on expenditure, both past and predicted, was a consistent feature of the hearings. The committee questioned several agencies on their predicted underspends; seeking detail on the reasons for underspends, their amounts, and how underspends would be dealt with.
- 2.11 Committee members also questioned officers of the Family Court of Australia, Federal Court of Australia, High Court of Australia, Federal Magistrates Court on the accountability and oversight mechanisms for federal judges. Officers told the committee that there are a range of accountability mechanisms in place, with each court having its own procedures for dealing with misconduct, conflicts of interest and complaints.
- 2.12 The committee sought details from the courts and tribunals on the numbers of self represented litigants, with officers from all courts and tribunals telling the committee that there had been an increase in self represented litigants in recent years. Officers provided details on how registries managed self represented litigants, highlighting areas where procedures and staff training had been adapted to improve service and efficiency.

#### **Procedural issues**

- 2.13 During the committee's examination of the Officer of the Privacy Commissioner, committee members raised concerns about commonwealth agencies and departments citing privacy as a reason for not providing information. Committee members expressed concern that it may reduce the ability of the committee to scrutinise the activities of government.<sup>10</sup>
- 2.14 In response to question on notice 60 from the Additional Estimates round of February 2007, ACS provided a copy of two submissions made to the House of Representatives Standing Committee on Legal and Constitutional Affairs which were accepted as confidential by that committee. As a matter of comity between the houses the committee resolved not to accept the submissions so as not to circumvent the decision of the House Legal and Constitutional Affairs Committee in relation to them.
