## Senator Cash asked:

What will be the detention capacity on the mainland once the centres have been completed and the extensions to existing facilities completed?

## Answer.

The Department needs to respond to the dynamic detention population in a flexible manner. As a result of this, the Department utilises a range of options including Immigration Detention Centres (IDC), Immigration Residential Housing (IRH), Immigration Transit Accommodation (ITA) and Alternative Places of Detention (APOD).

As at 30 June 2011, the table below shows the operational and contingency capacity for those facilities on the mainland.
