Senator Cash (L&CA 51) asked:

In relation to the 23 s501 cancellations that either the Minister cancelled or refused, provide the dates the department gave the submissions to the Minister. What cases were provided? Were any of these cancellations made under the general character provisions as opposed to criminal convictions?

Answer.

As stated by the Acting Secretary of the department at the Estimates hearing on 21 May 2012 it is not the practice of the department to provide information that might identify a person, or cohort. The department is bound by the provisions of the *Privacy Act 1988* which prevents the disclosure of any information that may identify a person.

In the 2011/2012 program year to 12 June 2012, the Minister has refused three visa applications and cancelled 21 visas under section 501.

Of the 24 cases considered by the Minister, 23 of those decisions concerned an individual who did not pass the character test on the basis that they had a substantial criminal record. One of those decisions was made using the general character provisions.
