Question No. 116

Senator Humphries asked the following question at the hearing on 18 October 2010:

- a) Can you give me an update on the AFP's dogs; how many dogs are currently enlisted within the AFP?
- b) Can you please provide me with a breakdown of how many dogs there are exercising each duty?

The answer to the honourable senator's question is as follows:

a) There are currently 52 canines deployed around Australia.

The Australian Federal Police (AFP) provides the following canine capability:

- Firearm and Explosive Detector Dogs (FEDD);
- Explosive Detector Dogs;
- Currency and Drug Detection Dogs (CADD); and
- General purpose or tactical dogs (for use by the Operational Response Group).

In February 2010, the Government announced additional funding over four years of \$17.8m to enhance the AFP's FEDD capabilities by providing an additional 17 FEDD teams at Australia's major international airports.

This initiative commenced on 1 July 2010 and its implementation is on schedule to be completed by 30 June 2011.

The ACT Policing Specialist Response and Security Unit provide a canine law enforcement capability to assist in the search and location of persons, the maintenance of public order and explosive detection.

b) The breakdown of how many dogs there are exercising each duty is outlined in Table 1.
