#### Answer:

#### Australia's Contribution to the Benefit Sharing Fund

In June 2010, Australia contributed \$1 million (US\$870,000) to the benefit sharing fund. The benefits to Treaty members include facilitated access to plant genetic resources for agricultural and food production; sharing of research and development; eligibility to share the benefits arising from the use of genetic resources under the Treaty system: and eligibility for financial support. Australian farmers benefit from the Treaty as over 95 per cent of Australian agriculture uses plant genetic resources from other countries.

The following projects preserve varieties of food and agricultural products that might otherwise be lost. Preserving these varieties maintains their availability for all treaty members, including Australia, for future use.
