On 23 September 2009, the Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry announced expenditure of \$14.7 million in 2009-10 to progress foundation elements of the biosecurity reforms. The \$14.7 million includes funding for scoping work on the proposed investment in information and communication technology. Further investment and timing of future implementation will be subject to government budget processes.
