8	Inspector of Transport Security	IOTS 01	O'Brien	(Appointment of Inspector of Transport Security) When was the Minister in possession of the list of suggestions from the Department?
9		IOTS 02	O'Brien	(Mr Palmer's Working Hours) Can you tell me how many days a week Mr Palmer devoted to his task as Inspector of Transport Security between his appointment on 23 November and 8 February, the date he was appointed to conduct the Rau inquiry?
9		IOTS 03	O'Brien	(Inspector of Transport Security Budget Expenditure) How much of the \$400,000 allocated to this office will not be spent this financial year as a result of the position being filled for only a small part of the year?
11		IOTS 04	O'Brien	(Inspector of Transport Security Budget Allocation) With regard to the allocation of \$1.6 million over four years in last year's Budget, there was no variation in the additional estimates statement. Do I take it that the Budget for this year, for next year and the following years remains at \$400,000? Mr Yuile —That is correct. Senator O'BRIEN —Can you give us a breakdown of how much has actually been expended in the current financial year, to date if possible? We certainly want the information about the amount expended on Mr Palmer's salary and travel and other entitlements. We would like the breakdown by category, please. Mr Yuile —Do you mean between his salary and travel? Senator O'BRIEN —Yes. I am not sure if there are any other

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				components that are critical. Mr Yuile —There would be a contribution for superannuation, for example. Are you looking for his gross salary? Senator O'BRIEN —I would have taken that to be rolled into the salary package component. We would also like the expenditure on travel, accommodation and the like. Are the premises that he is occupying rented?
13	Corporate Services	CORP 01	Bishop	(Consultancies for Departmental Restructure) Can you take on notice when the decision was made to retain the Nous consulting group, whether it was done by public tender or by appointment, an overview of the work they were involved in, costings submitted, bills paid, outstanding moneys yet to be paid and details of any ongoing role that that particular group might have over the next 12 months, or similar groups doing the same type of work, if they should be replaced, in lieu of Nous consulting. Senator MARK BISHOP—Could you also take on notice whether you can add any detail to expenses involved in the restructuring, broken up on consultancies, Departmental hours, planning, seminars and the like. Mr Yuile—I understand what you are getting at and we will do our best because there are things like the staff survey which is a discrete activity we undertake every couple of years, so that is easier enough to deliver, similarly, for the work of the Nous Group in working with our business areas. Some of that discussion—I am thinking ahead—and preparation for change would take place in the course of ordinary divisional and branch meetings. It is not as though we can undertake a special activity. Senator MARK BISHOP—Mr Yuile, where you can provide exact figures and give an indicative answer or a generalised comment, with a caveat that normally this work might be allocated elsewhere, do so. I just want to get a picture of what you did, who was involved, what it cost and what the future will involve—if any.

23-24		CORP 03	Bishop	(Break-up of Staffing Costs) Can you give me a table, Mr Ash, of your total revenue from ordinary activities, total staff numbers and FTEs for the last five years and then break up that total revenue for each year into the various line items?
25-26		CORP 04	Bishop	(AWA Break up) How many staff are covered by AWAs in the Department and how many are on the collective agreementCan you provide on notice a breakdown of the take-up of AWAs by gender and by classification?
26		CORP 05	Bishop	(AWA Benefits) You said there were some staff on AWAs paid more than the pay band for their classification under the certified agreement. Do you have an indicative figure of that?
27		CORP 06	Bishop	 (Additional Responsibility Allowance – ARA) You have agreed to take on notice that question of how many staff on AWAs are paid more than the pay band for the classification under certified agreements. Can you also do that for those purely under certified agreements? Mr Chandler—Sorry, would you please state that again. Senator MARK BISHOP—Say I am classified as a level 8 under a certified agreement and I am reclassified as a level 9 or whatever for a particular time or particular job or particular task. Can you provide me with details of the numbers of persons in that group so I can do a comparison with AWAs?

30		CORP 09	Bishop	 (Long Service Leave) You said that staff cannot be directed to take long service leave once it has fallen due; is that correct? Mr Chandler—That was my advice. As I indicated, I believe there is a legislative provision which protects long service leave. I would need to take that on notice. Senator MARK BISHOP—Can you take on notice and provide in writing the legislative instrument that regulates long service leave for staff in the Department? Can you provide a copy of that instrument? And can you, in your answer, draw my attention to the relevant clauses that prevent the Department from mandating staff to take long service leave after it falls due?
31		CORP 10	Heffernan	("Cashing in" LSL) If you allow people to cash it when it falls due, rather than when they finish and their pay rate might be double, why would you do yourself in the ear? Why wouldn't you let people cash it when it was due? They might have a better purpose for it then. Mr Chandler —As I was saying, I think it is the legislation that precludes that. CHAIR —Why? Has no-one ever argued this? Mr Chandler —We would need to take advice.

Mr Yuile—Your question is about recruited staff? Senator MARK BISHOP—Yes. Mr Yuile—So at the end of June 2004 and to say 30 April? Senator MARK BISHOP—That is fine.
32		CORP 12	Bishop	(New Staff) In the last 12 months the figure has gone from 836 to 1,088. Can you take on notice the number that came from within the service and those who came from without?

Mr Chandler —There is on our intranet site, our internal web site, an exit form which people are invited to complete. Managers are encouraged to ask exiting staff to complete that, and many do, but it is not something we impose as mandatory. Senator MARK BISHOP —What is the take-up rate—20 per cent, 30 per cent?
32-33		CORP 14	Bishop	 (External Consultancies) Can you provide me with a table in the same form for all external consultancies? Mr Chandler—If we may, we will provide the table in the form that is required for us to report each year, which covers all consultancies over \$10,000. It includes information on the firm, the service, the quantum and the selectionIf you can provide that and if you have updated figures, that would be of interest. Can you also provide a breakdown of consultant costs for all consultancies over the last three years and their variance to budget, if any, and a projection for next year?Answer the question for the last three years and, to the extent that you can, for the next 12 months. I understand the point that you are making. You will provide me with a copy of that answer too—
36	Bureau of Transport and Regional Services	BTRE 01	Bishop	(BTRE Staff Levels) Can you provide figures to the Committee showing the BTRE staffing levels for the past three years, including the current staff levels and the projected figures for the 2006 financial year?
54	Australian Transport Safety Bureau	ATSB 01	O'Brien	(Failure of Aircraft Engines) Is there any correlation between the age of an aircraft and the statistical probability of failure of engine or airframe over time?

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62	Office of Transport Security	OTS 01	O'Brien	(Delays in Investigation of Bag Theft) Earlier this year, I asked Mr Anderson a question on notice about the theft of checked baggage at Launceston airport belonging to a Ms Sarah Murfett. It was question on notice No. 367. The Minister advised me that the Office of Transport Security initiated and undertook an investigation. Ms Murfett's bag went missing on 12 November 2004. The Office of Transport Security did not investigate the matter until 3 February 2005, almost three months later. When did the Office of Transport Security become aware that Ms Murfett's bag had been stolen?
62-63		OTS 02	O'Brien	 (Baggage Tampering Investigation) Mr Anderson also says: it has been determined that it is a police matter as the incident involved an alleged theft of passenger baggage and that there is no evidence to suggest that aviation security was compromised. It is considered that this theft does not constitute an act of unlawful interference with aviation at Launceston airport. Clearly that means that the office knows more about the matter than Ms Murfett, who simply checked her bag in for her flight never to see it again. So what happened? Mr Tongue—I will get in contact with our Victorian office to get more detail on that than has been provided in the question on notice. Normally, in the course of those investigations, as I say, we would speak to staff on the ground about whether there was anything unusual in the passenger bags that day, was there something that might go to protective security settings and we would talk to Virgin Brisbane and make a judgment. But, certainly, we are not the people who follow up every lost bag in the system.

Mr Tongue—Yes. In some locations, for reasons of space, it might be done as a person is checking in. There might be some assessment as a person is checking in. Senator O'BRIEN—Does this 100 per cent guarantee include international flights from Christmas Island?Could you give us a percentage of domestic checked baggage that is currently subject to screening?
69		OTS 04	Bishop	(OTS Budget Allocation to Maritime Security) —Of the \$8 million increase, how much is allocated to maritime security?
69		OTS 05	Bishop	 (Staff Distribution) Can you do the break-up on policy or intelligence, compliance and enforcement as well? Mr Tongue—I would have to take that on notice. I will do that. Senator MARK BISHOP—Can you do the same analysis for the start of the 2004-05 financial year as well?
85		OTS 06	Bishop	 (AFP & ASIO Checks) In total, how many were adversely affected by the AFP-ASIO checks? Mr Tongue—I think we will have to take that one on notice if you want a really accurate number. Senator MARK BISHOP—Will you take that one on notice? Mr Tongue—Yes. Senator MARK BISHOP—Can you give me an indicative number for those noted as PMVs? Mr Crombie—My understanding is that it is at zero at this stage, but we will take that on notice to clarify it.

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88	Office of Transport Security	OTS 07	Bishop	(Government response to Report 400 on Aviation Security) Can you take on notice, in a more formal sense, when the Government will respond to the recommendations?
90		OTS 08	Bishop	 (Hand-Wand Deployment Kits) Can you give me an indicative figure, top and bottom, per unit price? Ms Dickman—I do not have that information, but we would be happy to provide that. Senator MARK BISHOP—Could you ask for that to be provided relatively quickly? Ms Dickman—I would like to be able to finalise the contract negotiations, given we are talking to a couple of parties in that process. I do not want to compromise the tender process by putting on the public record the bids from different tenderers.
91		OTS 09	Bishop	(Screening of Airport Staff) Mr Tongue, you had a lengthy discussion earlier with Senator O'Brien on security at airports, mainly to do with cocaine and Indonesia. I do not really want to go over that ground, so I will try and sieve my questions. What is the current rate of screening of airside staff at each of the capital city airports?Could you take on notice where we are at with the current rate of screening for each capital city airport?
93		OTS 10	Bishop	(Qantas Correspondence: Aircraft Surveillance) There was a report in the <i>Sydney Morning Herald</i> on 12 May which stated that Qantas had written to the federal Government asking for assistance in seeking to change state based legislation to allow the installation of security cameras, as most states have workplace surveillance legislation that prevents airlines from carrying out covert surveillance inside aircraft. When did the Government receive this correspondence from Qantas? Mr Tongue —I would have to check the exact date.

This is one of the issues—the continuation of the on-route subsidies—that the Government wishes to pick up in that broader charges review that it looks at in the context of the next year's budget. Senator O'BRIEN —Will they be looking at location-specific versus network pricing for the Airservices charges? Mr Dolan —Not that I am aware of. It is hard to predict what sorts of comments will come in from airlines when they wish to provide comments on these things. Mr Dolan—The original time frame was complete implementation for Sydney in 2004-05. Senator MARK BISHOP—And Adelaide? Mr Dolan—Adelaide, I think, was 2005-06, but I would have to check.

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				 Senator MARK BISHOP—How many of those applications have you received? Mr Williams—During the entire period since 1996? Senator MARK BISHOP—Yes. Mr Williams—I would have to take that on notice, Senator.

108	Territories and Local Government	TLG 01	O'Brien	(Christmas Island Airport Fire Service) Mr Dolan, can you confirm that the Christmas Island Airport does not have its own fire engine and fire service?
109		TLG 02	O'Brien	 (Christmas Island Airport) Christmas Island receives international flights, doesn't it? Mr Mrdak—It does or it did. Senator O'BRIEN—It does? Mr Mrdak—From my recollection, it did. The fire service is provided by the local fire—I think it is a volunteer fire brigade to which the Commonwealth had made a contribution in the past for
				equipment. Perhaps if I could take that on notice and come to you tomorrow. I will check with our Territories Bill—it has been a couple of years since I was last involved with the territories—what the current situation is and come back to you if I could.

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109	Office of Transport Security	OTS 11	O'Brien	(Dispute at Learmonth Airport) I recently travelled to Christmas Island on the scheduled National Jet Service. En route to Christmas Island, the plane landed at Learmonth airport to re-fuel and passengers were told that, contrary to usual practice, we were not able to disembark while refuelling took place, due to a dispute between DOTARS and the local council. Can you tell me about the Nature of that dispute between DOTARS and the Shire of Exmouth, when it began and when it will be resolved? Mr Dolan —I am not familiar with such a dispute. I am happy to take it on notice and make further investigations. I was not aware at least that aviation and airports division was in dispute with the airport but we will certainly make inquiries and report back to the Committee.
117	Civil Aviation and Safety Authority	CASA 01	O'Brien	(CASA Unscheduled Audits) —Over the past two years how many unscheduled audits have been undertaken in that period?
118		CASA 02	O'Brien	(Safety Regulation Corrective Action and Prosecutions) If we had the number of requests for corrective action and the number of prosecutions, we would have a good idea of the number of breaches that had been discovered?Can you get the information for us about requests for corrective action and prosecutions in that area?
124		CASA 03	O'Brien	 (Cuts in Staffing Numbers) I note on page 87 of this year's PBS that average staffing levels for 2005-06 are expected to be 650 compared with this year's average of 680. Where are these cuts in staffing numbers going to come from within CASA? Mr Gemmell—That stems from a few things. Three things in particular I would mention: we are going to complete a major program in the coming financial year, which is what you would know as the CASA IP program, which has been a major program running over the last few years. That will finish, on current timetable, later this year;

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				the product of that will be rolled out. The benefits that flow from that flow, and costs and staffing that attach to it reduce. We have been planning for some time the implementation of the regulatory reform program. We have separately given evidence here before that that is running slower than we anticipated, so we will not have the staffing levels we need for that. The third thing is from general efficiencies that we are looking to make in CASA. We are going to be reviewing business processes in CASA, particularly in the areas of corporate support, to ensure that we are providing them in the most efficient and effective way. We anticipate we might find ways of doing it more efficiently. Senator O'BRIEN —How many will be excess to requirement as a result of each of those three considerations?

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4	Civil Aviation and Safety Authority	CASA 04	Bishop	 (Applications for Senior Positions) So presumably the search agency has been in contact with you to advise you of the number? Mr Gemmell—I have not heard about the numbers that we have. We have not heard the results from them, but I expect to hear about that at any moment. From there, it is the process of sifting and sorting.
12		CASA 05	Heffernan	 (EGPWS) How expensive are these systems? Mr White—From memory, it costs something like \$US100, 000 for the enhanced or TAWS—as it is now called—equipment. CHAIR—Is it likely to cost more than the plane is worth? Mr Gemmell—We have not mandated them for all aircraft; we have mandated them for larger aircraft operating in passenger carrying operations. Senator MARK BISHOP—I missed the answer to Senator

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				Heffernan's question. What was the cost per unit? Mr White —From memory—and we would have to check—it is something like \$US100,000 but, as the Acting CEO was saying, we are only mandating it for aircraft over 570 kilos. So the older, cheaper aircraft would not be involved—the smaller ones.
18	Civil Aviation and Safety Authority	CASA 06	Bishop	(Audit of Transair) So you think that the four officers have not been employed in the Townsville office. Can you check with your offices and advise whether any of those four officers were employed at, or worked out of, the North Queensland office in 2003 or 2004.
19		CASA 07	O'Brien	(McGee's PNG License Loss) The <i>Courier Mail</i> article refers to a Mr McGee and some activities in Bougainville in PNG which I understand led to Mr McGee losing his PNG licence. Was CASA aware of that? Mr Gemmell —We were aware of it. Senator O'BRIEN —What action did CASA take if any?
19		CASA 08	O'Brien	(Bougainville Incident) The Bougainville incident involved Transair PNG, I take it? Mr Gemmell —I cannot confirm that. Senator O'BRIEN —Can you take that on notice? Mr Gemmell —I do not know—it could have been a private flight. I cannot confirm the details. I will take on notice what we actually know about that operation and what we were told about it by PNG. Senator O'BRIEN —If you could, and if you can let us know whether it was a charter flight or a private flight that would be good.
20		CASA 09	McLucas	(AOG for Hinterland) Could I get a copy of the AOC for Hinterland? Mr Gemmell —I cannot say I am familiar with Hinterland. I assume that it exists; so, if there is one, of course we will find a copy for you.

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21	Civil Aviation and Safety Authority	CASA 10	Heffernan	(TFU Hours) It was built in 1992. It was placed on the Australian Civil Aircraft Register in July 2003 and, when it was placed on there, it had 24,700 hours of service. So it had a relatively high number of hours. CHAIR—In 1993 it had 24,700 hours. Mr Gemmell—It had 24,700 hours in July 2003. CHAIR—How many hours did it have left on its engines? Mr Gemmell—I do not have information on that. CHAIR—But you would have it? Mr Gemmell—We will provide that.
24		CASA 11	O'Brien	(Cost of Accenture's Involvement in IP Project) What was the ultimate cost of their project involvement to the Department? How much have you paid them to date?
24		CASA 12	O'Brien	 (Breakdown of IP Project Costs) In terms of the contractual arrangements, did the project costs overrun in any area? Mr Gemmell—I would have to check. They certainly have not overrun at the levels I have been looking at. You are obviously asking me for something more detailed than that. I would have to check whether there were any overruns in any of the areas. The answer at the moment is not to my knowledge, but if I can check and come back on that, I will. Senator O'BRIEN—What sort of legal costs have been associated with the CASA IP program? Mr Gemmell—There have been some, obviously, on the contract and renegotiation of the contract. Be aware that we can employ external lawyers and we have our own internal lawyers, so it will take a little bit of work. Senator O'BRIEN—Can you give us a breakdown of the legal costs—the firm of lawyers used and costs of individuals? Mr Gemmell—Yes. Senator O'BRIEN—And, in general, can you tell us what sort of

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				 work the lawyers have done? Mr Gemmell—Yes, probably related to the contract and that sort of stuff. Senator O'BRIEN—It might relate to the contract and there may be other things involved. Mr Gemmell—Other things that we have asked for advice on, yes.
25	Civil Aviation and Safety Authority	CASA 13	O'Brien	(Mr Entsch complaints in Relation to Lip-Air) Did Mr Entsch complain to CASA in relation to its actions or proposed actions against Lip-Air? Mr Gemmell —We would have to check. The one I was referring to that we had a fair interaction about was action we took in respect of Cape York Air. What we eventually did is on the record. We would have to check, because none of us here is aware of any particular things on Lip-Air trading as Aero-Tropics. Senator O'BRIEN —Can you tell us how many complaints or representations Mr Entsch or his office have made to CASA in the last five years?Would you take that on notice, and would you also tell us the nature of the complaints and the action that resultedCould you identify the complaints originating from Mr Entsch or his staff that went through the Minister's office?
26		CASA 14	O'Brien	 (Complaint about CASA's Treatment of Commercial Operator) Can you confirm that a Liberal Senator from Western Australia complained about CASA's treatment of a commercial operator in that state because of the impact it was having on the operator's business? Mr Gemmell—When was that? Do you mean ever? Senator O'BRIEN—I am talking about in the last two years. Mr Gemmell—Yes, I can confirm we have received representations from a Senator about CASA's actions in respect of an operator. Senator O'BRIEN—On the basis of the impact it was having on the operator's business? Mr Gemmell—I might have to look at the letter to remind myself of the details of the complaint. They were certainly not happy with the actions CASA were taking in respect of that operator. Senator O'BRIEN—You were not happy with CASA's actions?

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				 Mr Gemmell—No, the complainant was not happy. Senator O'BRIEN—What role did the Minister's office play in dealing with that complaint? Mr Gemmell—As I recall, that letter was written to the Minister and was passed through to us to consider and provide advice on what we were doing. Senator O'BRIEN—Can you supply the Committee with the details of the NAture of the complaint? Mr Gemmell—It is a letter to the Minister, so I would have to seek his agreement that it be provided.
27	Civil Aviation and Safety Authority	CASA 15	O'Brien	 (2003 NAS Review) Is it true that the senior officers involved in the failed project received a letter from Mr Anderson's senior adviser about that involvement in 2003? Mr Gemmell—I would have to check, but nothing comes to mind. If you are talking about senior officers, you are talking about me and either the current Chief Executive or the previous Chief Executive Senator O'BRIEN—Correspondence from Mr Anderson's senior adviser in 2003 about that involvement, criticising those officers for failing to give the project appropriate priority. Mr Gemmell—I would have to take that on notice. Senator O'BRIEN—If such a letter exists can it be supplied to the Committee? Mr Gemmell—I will take that on notice.
28		CASA 16	O'Brien	 (Allegations of CASA's Inadequate Performance) Was the security of senior officers' employment raised as well arising from allegations of inadequate performance in relation to the proposed changes to the national airspace system? Mr Gemmell—Implicitly, in the sense that if we were failing to perform and to deliver objectives then our positions— Senator O'BRIEN—So you do recall something of that nature taking place in Mr Mathews's office? Mr Gemmell—I can recall conversations where there were concerns expressed about how things were going and how it was proceeding.

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				That is why I said you had to be specific. For us, or I think for anybody, it was not an easy process to go through and at various times there was some dissatisfaction with the performance of CASA. Senator O'BRIEN —You do not recall that being connected to correspondence from Mr Anderson's senior adviser? Mr Gemmell —I do not recall that. You are starting to stretch my memory of 2003 a bit. I do not recall anything in particular from the Minister's senior adviser. Senator O'BRIEN —We are talking about 18 months or two years ago. It is not the dark depths of time we are talking about, is it? If it occurred you would remember, wouldn't you? So I am wondering if you are unable to remember. Mr Gemmell —I would need to check. I can recall probably one piece of correspondence from the Minister's senior adviser. I do not recall that as being of any great moment in the course of events. I do not recall much else formally from the Minister's senior adviser.
