Answer:

The 'Targeted savings—public service efficiencies' measure only applies to agencies under the *Financial Management and Accountability Act 1997*. Responses for the Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry (DAFF) and relevant portfolio agencies are below.

DAFF

Reductions in domestic and international air travel are estimated to save \$842 000 each year over the forward estimates

DAFF continues to limit business class flights to the following circumstances:

- if a business class fare is less than or equal to the best economy class fare available at the time of booking, or where a complimentary upgrade is offered by the airline, provided this does not result in additional cost to the department;
- SES air travel exceeding 3 hours in duration per flight;
- where a DAFF official is accompanying the minister or another official/person who travels at a higher class and, for work purposes, is required to maintain contact with that person in order to discuss work matters; and
- for occupational health and safety reasons.

No separate records are kept for business class travel – only the categorisation of destination (domestic or international).

There has been a reduction in the use of external consultants and contractors. This has not impacted DAFF's ability to deliver on its priorities. Reductions in the use of external consultants and contractors are estimated to save \$944 000 each year over the forward estimates.

The majority of recruitment advertising is online. There may be exceptional circumstances where recruitment uses printed materials to target rural or remote, indigenous or highly specific industry candidates. These decisions are made and approved in accordance with current advertising guidelines. The estimated saving from moving recruitment advertising online is \$42 000 each year over the forward estimates.

Reductions in printing costs are estimated to save \$90 000 each year over the forward estimates. DAFF is actively monitoring expenditure on printing to ensure savings targets are achieved.

Australian Fisheries Management Authority (AFMA)

AFMA has a small requirement for business class flights and this is anticipated to be the case into the future, which will yield no savings for the agency. All AFMA employees are required to travel standard economy class. However, employees may travel in premium economy or business class (or equivalent) where;

- employees are accompanying a person who is entitled to travel at a higher class and for work purposes are required to maintain contact with that person; or
- because of special physical requirements (e.g. pregnancy, injury, disability); or
- other exceptional circumstances.
- This must be approved by the relevant General Manager prior to travel.
- General Managers are entitled to business class travel with the exception of travel under 90 minutes e.g. Canberra–Sydney or Canberra–Melbourne, which should be booked as economy class flights, although the CEO can vary this in exceptional circumstances;
- AFMA Commissioners are also allowed business class flights as part of the Remuneration Tribunal's ruling for part-time officers.

AFMA has already sought to reduce its contractor and consultancy expenditure. When comparing the internal 2012 budget to the 2013 budget, AFMA has recorded a 4.29 per cent or \$0.123 million reduction in anticipated contractor and consultant expenditure. AFMA anticipates a reduction of three per cent per annum in contractor and consultant expenditure in the forward years.

AFMA has moved to online recruitment advertising for the majority of vacancies advertised. This includes advertising on APSJobs and Seek as required. AFMA may still advertise in print media. This includes vacancies in remote localities (AFMA's Thursday Island office), where advertising in regional publications is considered necessary. AFMA moved to online recruitment to advertise the majority of its vacancies in 2010, which reduced the total spend on advertising. This practice has been in place since that time and, as a result, there are no additional estimated savings for each year over the forward estimates.

From 1 July 2012 to 30 April 2013, AFMA has spent \$38 665 on printing costs. For the same period last year, AFMA had spent \$46 615 on printing costs. The agency as a whole spends very little on printing costs so there is little scope for additional savings in the forward estimates.

Australian Pesticides and Veterinary Medicines Authority (APVMA)

The APVMA uses business class flights when there is a strong business case for this travel. There has been a reduction in business flight costs due to the recent whole-of-government procurement of air travel. The estimated savings in each year of the forward estimates is \$17000.

The APVMA only uses external consultants and contractors when a specialist skill is required and the function cannot be performed by existing staff. There has been an increase in external consultants and contractors this financial year to assist with the implementing the Better Regulation of Agricultural and Veterinary Chemicals reforms.

The APVMA has moved all its recruitment online since 1 July 2012. There has been no advertising in printed materials this financial year. The estimated savings in each year of the forward estimates is \$18 000.

The APVMA has reduced is printing costs by replacing its photocopiers and printers with multi-function devices from the major office machines panel. The estimated savings in each year of the forward estimates is \$21 000.

AFMA policy sets out that employees are required to travel economy class. However, employees may travel in premium economy or business class (or equivalent) where;

- employees are accompanying a person who is entitled to travel at a higher class and for work purposes are required to maintain contact with that person; or
- because of special physical requirements (i.e. pregnancy, injury or disability); or
- other exceptional circumstances, which must be approved by the relevant General Manager prior to travel.
- General Managers are entitled to business class travel with the exception of travel under 90 minutes (i.e. Canberra Sydney or Canberra Melbourne), which should be booked as economy class although the CEO can vary this in exceptional circumstances.

APVMA policy sets out that, for domestic flights, business class airfares can be accessed by SES-level employees. The APVMA has aimed to reduce its business class travel. Only 3.6 per cent of the APVMA's total number of domestic flights from 1 July 2012 to 30 April 2013 have been in business class. For international flights, both SES and non-SES staff can access business class flights when the flight is greater than four hours duration.

6. Yes, in some cases airline lounge memberships are provided to DAFF employees. DAFF has 281 active lounge memberships for Qantas and Virgin Australia purchased for employees across a broad range of classifications. DAFF's policy on airline lounge memberships is that access should be on the basis of need and there is a value-for-money consideration, independent of booking travel. The total cost of DAFF's airline lounge memberships for the financial year to date (as at 30 April 2013) is \$39 992. The Senior Executive Service (SES) total is \$9 516 and non-SES total is \$30 476.

AFMA does not provide airline lounge memberships to employees.

APVMA provides airline lounge memberships to frequent travellers. The APVMA's policy on airline lounge memberships is that access should be on the basis of need and there is a value-for-money consideration. APVMA has 10 active lounge memberships for Qantas and Virgin Australia purchased for employees across a broad range of classifications. The cost for the financial year to date is \$2637.

CRDC provides Qantas lounge memberships to employees. Qantas lounge memberships have been purchased for nine employees at a cost of \$2973 for the financial year to date.

FRDC provides Qantas and Virgin Australia lounge memberships to employees. Qantas and Virgin Australia lounge memberships have been purchased for 13 employees at a cost of \$2628 for the financial year to date. Lounge access provides FRDC's employees with a secure environment between flights and allows employees to work while travelling.

GRDC offers Qantas Club memberships to permanent staff who are required to travel on at least five return flights per annum for GRDC business. There are currently 39 staff members on GRDC's Corporate Membership Scheme. Of the 39 staff members, six are project and administration staff, 13 are managers, nine are senior managers and 11 are executives. 25 membership holders are on Gold Tier or above and, therefore, are not required to pay an annual fee. The cost for the financial year to date is \$4060.

GWRDC provides Qantas lounge memberships on an ad hoc basis to employees. The cost for the financial year to date is \$441.

RIRDC policy allows that the Managing Director may approve airline lounge memberships for employees. Lounge memberships for Qantas and Virgin Australia have been purchased for nine employees at EL1, EL2 and SES levels at a cost of \$2886 in 2012–13 (to 30 April 2013).

SRDC provides Qantas and Virgin Australia lounge memberships to seven employees. The cost for the financial year to date is \$1379.

WAC provides senior managers with lounge memberships. There are approximately six managers who have Qantas club cards.

- 1. All misuse of corporate credit cards is reported to the Fraud and Security Team for appropriate action.
- 2. Credit card use is monitored through online processing by the cardholder, reviewed by an authorising officer and the credit card team. Periodic reviews are undertaken to ensure ceased officers have had their credit card cancelled. Reviews are also carried out on the number of cards with DAFF and associated limits of each card.
- 3. In the event of suspected credit card misuse, the item is reported to DAFF's Fraud and Security Team for appropriate action.
- 4. For the current financial year (to 30 April 2013) there have been 24 instances recorded of use outside of DAFF's credit card policy across various staff classifications.
 - Eleven instances of misuse were due to accidental personal use, with the amounts being repaid in full to DAFF.
 - Twelve instances of misuse were due to cardholders splitting the full value of purchase over multiple transactions.

The officers and their authorising officers were reminded of DAFF's policy on credit card use. This misuse represents less than 1 per cent of cardholders and credit card expenditure.

5. There are a number of actions aimed at the prevention of credit card misuse. These include the issuing of instructional information on using corporate credit cards, training, limiting access to credit cards on a needs basis and by setting transaction and monthly limits on cards.

AFMA

- 1. If a corporate credit is misused, the AFMA employee must repay funds immediately. This misuse is recorded on AFMA's Certificate of Compliance and, if there is continued misuse, the employee's corporate credit is removed.
- 2. Corporate credit card use is monitored through AFMA's Expense Management System, the Finance section auditing corporate credit cards, and AFMA's Certificate of Compliance Process.
- 3. Please see response to question 1.
- 4. During the 2012–13 financial year, there have been three instances of misuse of the corporate credit card. All relate to mini-bar purchases whilst travelling. AFMA allows a threshold of \$20 per day for incidental expenditure and this threshold was exceeded on three occasions. The highest value was \$40.60. The staff classifications for the breaches were an EL2, and two EL1s. The staff involved have been notified of their breaches, required to pay back the difference and have been referred to AFMA's Chief Executive Instructions, Credit Card Policy and Travel Policy.
- 5. AFMA has several measures in place to stop misuse of Corporate Credit Cards:
 - All employees are required to submit Corporate Credit acquittals by the last day of each month. Their manager reviews the employee's expenditure and approves it.
 Upon approval, AFMA's Finance Section then reviews the expenditure before finalising it for payment.
 - AFMA's Finance Section chooses approximately seven employee's corporate credit files for audit each month. All corporate credit cards are reviewed by the Finance team each year as part of this audit process.

If the investigation confirms that the card has been misused, the cardholder may be subject to disciplinary action ranging from sanctions or reduction in rank through to dismissal. GRDC

1. The Executive Manager of Corporate Services is responsible for the investigation of all instances of alleged credit card misuse and of all matters involving serious misconduct. The Executive Manager will decide whether to deal with a matter in either the criminal arena or as a breach of the GRDC Code of Conduct, or both, after an analysis of the available evidence.

Referrals to the AFP and Commonwealth Director of Public Prosecutions (CDPP) are undertaken on an as needs basis and in conformance with the guidelines and procedures relevant to those organisations. In cases involving matters of national security, advice will be sought from the Attorney-General's Department.

- 2. GRDC monitors corporate credit cards as listed below:
 - All expenditure to be approved by supervisor, using staff claim form with supporting tax invoices.
