- Credit card use is monitored through online processing by the cardholder, reviewed by an authorising officer and the credit card team. Periodic reviews are undertaken to ensure ceased officers have had their credit card cancelled. Reviews are also carried out on the number of cards with the department and associated limits of each card.
- In the event of suspected credit card misuse, the item is reported to the Department's Fraud and Security Team for appropriate action.
- For the current financial year (to 31 October 2012) there have been five instances of misuse discovered. The range of staff classifications are APS5 to EL2. Three instances of misuse were due to accidental personal use, with the amounts being repaid in full to the department. Two instances of misuse were due to card holders splitting the full value of purchase over multiple transactions. These officers and their authorising officers were reminded of the department's policy on credit card use.

#### **Answer:**

The taxi costs identified are a reflection of Biosecurity's role and presence across the country and across cities and regions. Biosecurity operations require officers to be present at dispersed locations and travel expenditure is incurred as a result.

The expenditure is made up of trips to and from airports, accommodation, meetings, conferences and other work related activities.

Yes. Due to the large volume of transactions the analysis required to accurately identify the cost recovered sum would take a considerable amount of time and effort. Such an analysis is not considered to be an appropriate allocation of resources.

Alternatives to using taxis vary depending on the options available at the particular location and the time of day or night. Alternatives to the use of taxis include leased vehicles, public transport, and walking. Departmental officers use the mode of transport that represents the most efficient and effective value for money outcome for the Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry, while taking reasonable account as to the health and safety of the officer.

#### Answer:

The Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry undertakes a case by case assessment of the use of virtual meetings in place of face to face meetings. This is applied to both appropriated and non appropriated activities.

We do not collect information that tracks specific savings from the use of virtual meetings verses face to face meetings.

Any cost savings achieved by using virtual meetings for non appropriated activities are directly passed on and reflected in the year to date industry reserve's balance.

An example of where virtual meetings are being utilised to reduce costs to industry is in the monthly senior management meetings held within the Northern Region. Regions such as Northern and South West Regions have offices and senior staff in Darwin/Cairns and Perth/Adelaide respectively. Regional leadership meetings are held in all Regions on a monthly basis to discuss governance issues such as key priorities, financial and human resource management, business planning and upcoming training priorities. For those regions that only have the one major centre, these meetings are held face to face, however for the Northern and South West Regions video conferencing is used to reduce the costs associated with travel. While face to face meetings tend to be more effective, we try to limit these to once a quarter and hold the balance via video conference.

The approximate cost for video conference is \$27.00 per hr. Therefore a 6hr video conference is approximately \$162.00. In comparison, the costs incurred if the Regional Leadership Meeting is in Cairns (for four staff) totals approximately \$4400. The costs incurred if the Regional Leadership Meeting is in Darwin (for four staff) totals approximately \$5800.

We acknowledge your letter of 21<sup>st</sup> December 2011 to all AICCC industry members regarding industry representation on the ICON Redevelopment Project Board (IRPB). Your letter notes that the current representative, Mr. Hart Krtschil, held the position pursuant to his role as the Secretariat of the AICCC but that that position would no longer exist when the AICCC Secretariat contract ended on 31<sup>st</sup> December 2011. Accordingly, the Department was seeking a nomination for industry representative on the IRPB.

Following a consultative process and consideration the industry AICCC members who form the Industry Working Group on Quarantine (IWGQ) Ltd, nominate Mr Krtschil for the position of industry representative on the IRPB.

The statement in your letter" in your consideration, please note that the IRPB is unable to provide funding to support industry representation on the board." is noted. However it is the industry view that travel expenses and other related costs to attend IRPB and other BICON meetings should be met by the project.

As can be perceived the "year of delivery", it is assumed, will require the industry member be part of the roll out process as well as attend IRPB meetings.

As industry is already funding 75 per cent of the project expenses (an amount in excess of \$30million) it is assumed that these costs which are related to the project would form part of that expense.

Given the magnitude, longevity and high priority of this project, it would be prudent that appropriate budgeting for the duration of the project would occur.

Accordingly, the IWGQ believe it is appropriate for the IRPB to consider the question of funding the travel expenses of the industry representative at its next meeting and we request that issue be brought to the attention of the IRPB

The IWGQ are committed to the success of BICON and look forward to the further valueable contribution by industry through Mr Krtschil assisting in meeting the project objectives.

### Answer:

- 1. The Australian Government has committed over \$400 million in Budget funding to support the acquisition of a site and the construction of new facilities. Reflecting longstanding practice commercial costs of individual consignments, including the costs of transportation after release from quarantine will remain a matter for importers.
- 2. The department was forced into canvassing new Post Entry Quarantine arrangements due to a previous decisions to sell the five existing PEQ facilities only to lease them back. Unfortunately, satisfactory lease renewal arrangements at most of the facilities are not available. The decision to consolidate DAFF post entry quarantine operations at a single location was the subject of consultation during the required 2 pass business case process.
- 3. The 2 pass business case process settled on Victoria as the preferred location In excess of 25 potential sites for the future facility were considered before settling on a shortlist of sites within Victoria.

Victoria was found to have a greater selection of land available within close proximity to International Airports at a lower cost, with less likelihood of urban encroachment over the life of the station. Additionally, Victoria is in a climatic zone conducive to the growth of the majority of plant species subject to quarantine and less prone to vectors of plant and animal disease.
