## **Correction to Evidence – 2018 Budget Estimates**

**Dear Senator** 

In reviewing the Proof Committee Hansard of the Senate Economics Committee Budget Estimates hearing of 31 May 2018, two matters have been identified which require the record to be corrected. Corrected information in relation to these matters follow. In addition, there are three other matters in which I would like to provide additional information.

## **AAHL Funding**

During Dr Dave Williams's testimony, he stated the 1984 Australian Animal Health Laboratory (AAHL) Cabinet Submission had an operational funding "as 50:50 between CSIRO and AHHL and that CSIRO would cover 100 per cent of the capital funding cost" (Hansard page 127).

We have confirmed that the Cabinet Submission referenced makes no mention of capital funding.

## Submission to the Review of the Defence Trade Controls Act 2012 (Cth)

There was some confusion among CSIRO officers about whether CSIRO would be making a submission to the review of the *Defence Trade Controls Act 2012 (Cth)* directly or through its Department (Hansard page 133). CSIRO advised the Committee that CSIRO was making a submission to that review through the Department of Industry, Innovation and Science, however I now advise that CSIRO has made its own submission to the review, after consulting with the Department.

**Defence Export Controls** 

In response to questions from Senator Carr regarding Defence Export controls, I indicated that I would

provide additional information regarding a related historical matter (Hansard page 132). I wish to advise the

Committee that this related to the proposed export of a piece of scientific equipment to the International

Atomic Energy Agency for supply to the Pakistan Institute of Science and Technology in 2012. CSIRO was

informed by the IAEA that the equipment was intended for use related to mining and exploration. The export

was stopped by the Australian Customs and Border Protection Service and referred to the Defence Export

Controls Office for technical assessment. Following discussion with and advice from officials, CSIRO did not

proceed with the export.

**GBIRd** research project

During questioning from Senator Rhiannon regarding the GBIRd research activity, Dr Steele indicated that

the value of CSIRO's contract for this research was less than \$100,000 (Hansard page 119). For completeness

of the record, CSIRO's sub-contract is with North Carolina State University and is valued at \$USD74,664 for

Phase 1, scheduled for the period that ends 30 April 2019. The contract also provides for incremental funding

associated with prospective future project Phases (yet to be agreed) for an "Incrementally Estimated Total"

of \$USD218,825 for the time period ending 30 April 2021.

**Breakthrough Listen** 

In response to a question asked by Senator Carr regarding the value of Breakthrough Listen project,

Dr Marshall indicated that "roughly \$10 million" was provided for this activity (Hansard page 125). For

transparency, CSIRO's contract with the Breakthrough Prize Foundation provides them with 25 percent of

the minimum number of hours scheduled for scientific observations with the Parkes radio telescope from

1 July 2016 – 30 June 2021, at a total contract value of \$7.5m on a full cost recovery basis.

It would be appreciated if you could please pass this information on to the Committee.
