The other thing that stood out was the telephone system. Is that a centralised system? ¶Ms Cosson: It's still quite decentralised. We have a number of offices across our state offices that do pick up our calls. We're reducing the hundreds of phone lines that we had into a single phone line, the 1800VETERAN line, to make it easier. We're also trialling new technology—open speech. Our veterans, when they phone now through 1800, can do voice recognition, but they still have the opportunity to go to a human if they need to. It's diverting the calls to the right operator through open speech. A lot of those efficiencies will improve the back-of-house services that we've been providing. ¶Senator GALLACHER: I haven't looked at your financial reports, but I suppose you have a telecommunications budget. Are you saying that centralising it to a 1800 number will mean you no longer have to pay multiple line rentals and multiple contracts over multiple offices? ¶Ms Cosson: That's correct. ¶Senator GALLACHER: Perhaps on notice, could we see a sample of that sort of efficiency and how much it does save? ¶Ms Cosson: Certainly. ¶Senator GALLACHER: I think it's a critical area of infrastructure improvement. Is that an element in the development of the budget response and the budget process in DVA? ¶Ms Cosson: Not that I'm aware of, Senator, but I'll check for you. Everyone will hold a veterans card rather than a health card. The next global refresh is happening next year. That \$11.1 million is basically staffing and project management, business engagement, posting and printing, lapel pins and ICT development, so it encompasses more than just the cards. ¶Senator GALLACHER: Are you at the stage of a timetable for the rollout of those items under the \$11 million refresh? ¶Mr McHardie: Yes, we are, Senator. ¶Senator GALLACHER: Can we get a copy of that perhaps? ¶Mr McHardie: Yes, we could. ¶Senator GALLACHER: On notice would be fine. Ms Cosson, I want to clarify an issue with MyService that has come up. In terms of a veteran who is part of a same-sex partnership and identifies as being same-sex married, are they able to access MyService? ¶Ms Cosson: Absolutely. MyService doesn't discriminate at all on gender or marital situation. ¶Senator MOORE: Is there anything when they apply where they have to identify? An issue has been raised about different IT systems, that the DHS system actually does accept the code or statement of being in a marriage but the DVA one doesn't accept 'marriage'; it accepts 'partner'. That's the statement. I'm just wanting to put it up there— ¶Ms Cosson: I'll have to have a look, Senator. ¶Senator MOORE: Could that be checked out? It has actually been raised as an issue. It sounds to me like it's about confusion, but it was a particular concern. ¶Ms Cosson: I'll certainly take that on notice, Senator, and have a look. ¶Senator MOORE: Thank you very much. The reduction in staff has resulted from a number of efficiencies but also where we have looked at a shared service arrangement with the Department of Human Services and the Department of Social Services. For example, about two years ago we transitioned our information and communication technology branch from the department on a secondment to the Department of Human Services to look at rolling out our Veterans' services system. That accounts for quite a significant proportion of the 108 reductions. We've also had natural attrition. Our workforce is actually an older or a more mature workforce, so there has been quite a bit of natural attrition as well through that period. ¶Senator GALLACHER: From that I gather there's no contemplation of redundancies? ¶Ms Cosson: There have been redundancies, absolutely. ¶Senator GALLACHER: But that's normal—¶Ms Cosson: That is normal practice in managing where, for example, we've changed our focus or we've got new technologies. Some staff felt that they didn't have the skills for the new jobs, and they would, in some instances, be offered a voluntary redundancy. But there have been no forced redundancies. ¶Senator GALLACHER: Redeployment? ¶Ms Cosson: Redeployment: where we can do that, that's always one of the first options. If the staff don't possess the skills for the new tasks, then we would look to redeploy them, in the first instance, to somewhere else in the department. ¶Senator GALLACHER: Perhaps you could take on notice how many people have accepted a voluntary package in the last 12 months and what the cost of that was. ¶Ms Cosson: Yes, I can take that on	Hansard	98	24/05/2019

I think it worked out to be approximately 30 per cent of current costs that we spend on our private hospitals—that we could save 30 per cent, to be then reinvested into our veterans care. ¶Senator GALLACHER: Was that analysis done internally, or externally? ¶Ms Cosson: It was done internally, but we partnered with some healthcare providers to get some analysis, and we also worked closely with the Department of Health based on their modelling and their data for Australian citizens and private insurers. ¶Senator GALLACHER: So, it wasn't an additional cost to work this out? It was done in-house as part of someone's formal job? ¶Ms Cosson: No. It was part of our transformation a budget ago, where we received some funding to explore opportunities in treatment pathways. ¶Senator GALLACHER: Do we know how much this analysis cost? ¶Ms Cosson: Sorry; I don't have that. They have met regularly since the 2018-19 budget to discuss this with us, and their major focus in these meetings has been technical adjustments to the OT fee schedule. A number of technical adjustments were implemented with effect from 1 March 2019. They've discussed the impact of the treatment cycle on clients with complex health needs, noting that they would typically see a patient for fewer than 12 sessions. So they've advocated to increase DVA fees for occupational therapy services. ¶CHAIR: What do you pay them per hour or whatever? ¶Mr Cormack: We should be able to get some help with that. ¶Ms Cosson: We'll get that for you. ¶CHAIR: Have you done a comparison with other Commonwealth agencies like Comcare and NDIS? How do we justify the disparity? ¶Mr Cormack: I'll get you some more details on the disparities. This is the last question in this area: Secretary, how do you explain that the preliminary costing of excluding TPI and SRDP recipients from this treatment cycle was anticipated to be \$22 million when the measure itself is expected to save \$20 million? Does this mean that allied health treatment cycles are overwhelmingly impacting TPI and SRDP recipients? ¶Ms Cosson: The measure was to deliver the \$40 million save and to reverse that save for TPI. The estimate was approximately \$22 million, but we would then have to find a different offset to reverse that. The analysis that was completed for the allied health study had a look at predominantly the physiotherapy and exercise physiology for our veteran community. I don't think I have the data in my pack. We did the analysis to see if that was potentially something that we could do to reverse for TPIs. ¶Senator GALLACHER: I'm not sure I got a clear answer there. Is it overwhelmingly impacting TPI and SRDP recipients? Are they the main cohort— ¶Senator MOORE: The largest users. ¶Senator GALLACHER: where this saving is going to come from? ¶Ms Cosson: I'll need to have a look; I might be able to get you the answer shortly. For exercise physiology and physiotherapy, there was quite a significant lot of data in relation to access to those particular allied health providers, and, yes, in the TPI community. ¶Senator GALLACHER: If you could provide that on notice, that would be good.
