GRANT TO ALLOW BERRY STREET CHIEF TO RESEARCH TRENDS

Anita Pell is heading overseas on a mission to help Australia recruit and retain foster carers.

Pell, Hume Ms regional director of Berry Street, has been awarded a Churchill Fellowship to research the foster care networks. of Ireland, England, the United States and Canada.

From May next year, Ms Pell will spend about two months visiting and observing foster care organisations.

"I couldn't stop crying, I am so honoured and privileged to be awarded a Churchill Fellowship," Ms Pell said of the award.

Her project is aimed at improving Australia's foster care system, especially in relation to recruiting and retaining foster carers.

The number foster carers in Victoria dropped from 5500 in 2002 to just 985

"Foster carers are leaving the system in alarming numbers, while the demand for them is becoming greater and greater, Ms Pell said.

Her research will look at how to attract vounger foster carers and provide them with greater support.

In the UK, foster care agencies provide an income for carers, which has succeeded in attracting more people.

'In the UK, people can be foster carers as a career has that choice is unavailable," Ms Pell

"We (in Australia) no longer haye a choice about where to put a child; 10 years ago there may have been five or six candidates for each child, we now struggle for one.

"If we don't change our recruiting and retention system, we could be without a foster care system within five-to-10 years.

Ms Pell said she wanted to thank her employer, Berry Street, for supporting her "and the Churchill Trust for giving me such a wonderful opportunity".

The Winston Churchill Memorial Trust awards more than 100 Churchill Fellowships each year.

Each fellowship is comprised of a cash grant -- the average value being \$25 000 allowing the recipient to travel internationally conduct research.

Ms Pell's scholarship has also been sponsored by The Jack Brockhoff Foundation, a fund set up by the late Sir Jack Brockhoff to support organisations which promote the health and wellbeing of communities.
