I believe the Government's proposed CPRS is flawed. The legislation has been fastracked to its own detriment and in its current form, leaves the door open for too many loopholes and dodgy deals, potentially rendering the outcome a dissapointment and embarrassment on the world arena. Australia's 5% reduction target is weak, particular given recent promises from the US, but even ignoring that, in its current form the CPRS does not promise to be a useful tool in achieving Australia's greenhouse reduction targets.

The over complication of carbon reduction is baffling, and I hope rather than repeat mistakes of the EU trading scheme of over permitting and allowing loopholes for the biggest polluters to come out on top, Australia wil choose to learn from teh EU and improve upon. - less free permits

I would even like to see a review of the consumer pays option, rather than the text book polluter pays as I'm not convinced a company should be the only one to blame for excessive consumption.

A low carbon future will mean change, but change doesn't have to be bad. I hope you will take these thoughts on board, as they are shared by many.
