

STANDING COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN AFFAIRS, DEFENCE AND TRADE

Inquiry into the Provisions of the Australian Participants in British Nuclear Tests (Treatment) Bill 2006; and, the Australian Participants in British Nuclear Tests (Treatment) (consequential Amendments and Transitional Provisions) Bill 2006

On 11 October 2006, the Senate referred the provisions of the above bills to the Senate Standing Committee on Foreign Affairs, Defence and Trade for inquiry and report by Tuesday, 7 November 2006.

The Bills provide for non-liability treatment of and testing for cancer, for eligible Australian participants in the British nuclear tests conducted in Australia in the 1950s and 1960s.

The Committee invites individuals and organisations to make a written submission on the Bills. Because of the short timeframe, the Committee requests that submissions be lodged as soon as possible and by 27 October 2006. Submissions should be addressed to:
