Submission to the Inquiry into the Commonwealth Electoral Amendment (Democratic Plebiscites) Bill 2007

I cannot believe that our elected representatives have fallen so low in integrity, as to try to dignify this piece of political engineering as a "Democratic" Plebiscite (quite apart from misspelling Plebiscite (Plebicite) in the Courier Mail advertisements).
