Submission to the Senate Finance and Public Administration Committee inquiry on the Commonwealth Electoral Amendment (Democratic Plebiscites) Bill 2007

I support the provisions of the above Bill.

I understand that the Bill amends the Electoral Act 1918 to achieve two objectives:

1. Allowing the Australian Electoral Commission, (AEC), to conduct plebisoites in local government areas throughout Australia; and

 Making state laws ineffective to the extent that they prohibit a person or body from or penalize a person or body for, making an arrangement with the AEC to conduct such a plebiscite or taking part in or assisting with the conduct of such a plebiscite.

I understand that the federal government has introduced the Bill in response to the Queensland Local Government Reform Implementation Act 2007, (Act), which contains provisions designed to prohibit local councils from conducting polls on questions about, amongst other things, the forced amalgamation of existing councils legislated by the Act.

I consider the Act to represent an attack on the democratic right to free speech on the subject of forced council amalgamations.

I am acutely aware of the importance of this subject in the community of Redcliffe and I feel strongly about the need for councils' to seek the views of their communities by way of a poll when subjects of such magnitude are at hand.

The Bills seeks to overturn the state government's attack and I support the Bill for this reason.

I note that, at the time of writing, the Queensland Government has introduced a Bill to amend the Act by removing those sections designed to prohibit the conduct of polls. I support the Bill regardless of the state government's reversal as the Bill represents a form of protection against an attack of this nature occurring in the future.

I would welcome the opportunity to give evidence at any public hearing of the Finance and Public Administration Committee.
