Plebiscite for an Australian Republic Bill 2008

In response to the invitation to make a submission on this bill, I wish to put the following to the Committee for their consideration:

- 1. There is only one way to change the constitution. This is a referendum. So why isn't it being used?
- 2. Details of the proposed republic are being kept secret. Surely we should know what is being planned before we vote.

- 9. The agenda of many if not most republicans includes changing our flag.
