Re. The Private Member's Bill called "Plebiscite for an Australian Republic Act 2008".

I submit that a Plebiscite asking the question "Do you support Australia becoming a republic? Is totally un-necessary for the following reasons:-

- 1. The question was put to a referendum in 1999 and defeated in all States and nationally.
- 2. There is no popular demand to change our constitution in this way.
- 3. The estimated cost of \$10 M plus is unwise expenditure at a time of financial stress.
- 4. A Plebiscite is advisory only; the proper way to change the constitution is by Section 128 where the question is put in detail so people can see exactly what they are voting for.
- 5. I certainly do not want to have to go through the process we have just seen in the USA with massive funds being spent on the contenders' campaigns.
- 6. Australia changed its Head of State last year with a minimum of fuss and expense. Why make things more complicated?
