

Groups Within the Australian Diaspora

For the purposes of this submission the Southern Cross Group has identified in this table a number of groups that represent separate, identifiable groups within the Australian Diaspora.

Part 1 - Groups Consisting of Australian Citizens

Group	Nature of Diaspora Group
DiA	Citizens who have emigrated from Australia and are residing overseas for an indefinite period, for employment reasons, or for carrying on any business or vocation.
DiB	<p>Citizens who have emigrated from Australia to their country of birth, more or less on a permanent basis.</p> <p>Predominant in this group would be those naturalised Citizens from Groups CB and CG who have returned in retirement to their country of birth.</p> <p>The group would also include some from Groups CE and CF.</p>
DiC	<p>Citizens who have travelled overseas on a short to medium term basis to study or to gain wider experience in their chosen career before returning to live permanently in Australia.</p> <p>Over time, a number from this group could be expected to convert to Group DiA.</p>
DiD	<p>Citizens who have travelled overseas on a short to medium term basis to experience life in other countries prior to settling down to life back in Australia.</p> <p>Many backpackers and those working under the various bi-lateral working holiday agreements that Australia has established with other countries would fall within this group.</p> <p>Over time, a number from this group could also be expected to convert to Group DiA.</p>
DiE	Overseas-born Citizens in Group CE who have never resided permanently in Australia.
DiF	Citizens who have moved overseas for a variety of personal reasons

	<p>not covered above, eg marriage, lifestyle, political inclinations, etc and are committed to living overseas on a more or less permanent basis.</p> <p>Some within this group would initially have been in Groups DiC and DiD</p>

Part 2 – Groups Among Those Without Australian Citizenship

Group	Nature of Additional Diaspora Groups
ADA	Those former Australian Citizens who lost their citizenship under the provisions of former section 17 and have not been able to resume their citizenship under the provisions of section 23AA of the Australian Citizenship Act 1948.
ADB	Australian-born children of Australian Citizens in Group ADA who lost their Citizenship as a consequence of their parents' loss under section 17 and are aged 18 or less.
ADC	Australian-born children of Australian Citizens in Group ADA who lost their Citizenship as a consequence of their parents' loss under section 17 and are aged over 18.
ADD	Overseas-born children of an Australian Citizen whose birth was duly registered as an Australian Citizen, but who lost their Citizenship as a consequence of their parents' loss under section 17 and are aged 18 or less.
ADE	Overseas-born children of an Australian Citizen whose birth was duly registered as an Australian Citizen, but who lost their Citizenship as a consequence of their parents' loss under section 17 and are aged over 18.
ADF	Those former Australian Citizens who were required by another country to renounce their Citizenship under section 18 of the Act and have not been able to resume their Citizenship under the provisions of section 23AB of the Act.
ADG	Overseas-born spouses of Australian Citizens who continue to live overseas where the spouse is not yet able to take advantage of the visa provisions relating to permanent residence in Australia.

ADH	<p>Overseas-born dependent children of Australian Citizens who continue to live overseas where the child is not eligible for Australian Citizenship under sections 10A or 10B of the Australian Citizenship Act 1948 and is not yet able to take advantage of the visa provisions relating to permanent residence in Australia.</p>
ADJ	<p>Those foreign citizens who have at least one Australian parent but who were not registered as an Australian Citizen under the provisions of sections 10B or 10C.</p>
ADK	<p>Those who have ancestral links to an Australian Citizen but are not themselves Australian Citizens.</p> <p>The SCG believes that the nature of the linkage is a matter for further consideration but should be, as a minimum, a direct link to a grandparent.</p>
ADL	<p>Non-Australian citizens who remained overseas when one or more of their children migrated to Australia as permanent residents.</p>
ADM	<p>Non-Australian citizens who remained overseas when one or both of their parents migrated to Australia as permanent residents.</p>
ADN	<p>Other persons, not of Australian ancestry, who are seen to be active supporters of the Australian nation, its cultural identity and heritage, through their regular involvement in Australian expatriate organisations, other relevant organisations, and/or otherwise promoting Australia's interests.</p>
