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Senate Inquiry Submission

Migration Amendment (Designated Unauthorised Arrivals) Bill 2006

The proposed changes to the Migration Act, described as a "knee-jerk reaction to appease Indonesia", have been widely criticised by the media, public, opposition and coalition members alike. And rightly so.

If these laws pass, asylum seekers will not be able to stay in mainland detention centres while their claims are processed. Instead, it will be on Nauru, Christmas Island and Manus Island - out of sight and scrutiny of the media and the Australian people - that their cases will be determined.

Furthermore, detainees will have no access to the Australian medical system and case managed mental health care. Access to Australian legal counsel, visitors and advocacy agencies will be severely limited. By keeping detainees offshore, they will not be protected by the oversight of the Commonwealth Ombudsman, and will therefore be extremely vulnerable.

The United Nations Universal Declaration of Human Rights states in Article 14 that "every person has a right to seek asylum in any territory to which they can gain access". By excising the entire Australian mainland, we are severely limiting access to our territory and therefore the right to seek asylum. This effectively means that true refugees, the ones who can't fly into Sydney Airport but may barely afford a boat ticket, are excluded. As a result Australia denies asylum to any real refugees.

The legislation is distressingly regressive, reversing Australia's progress last year in ensuring children are kept out of indefinite detention. If these laws pass, children can once again be returned to detention, and are at extreme physical and mental risk. In Australia, the only documented incidents of *pre-adolescent* suicide attempts are in immigration detention.

Finally, the proposed legislation is born of questionable motivations. Criticised as an attempt to "appease Indonesia", Australia is at risk of tainting the refugee determination process with our own domestic interests. International Human Rights Law is intended to transcend nationalistic foreign affairs issues.
