To the Senate Legal and Constitutional Committee inquiry in opposition to the Anti-terrorism Bill 2005.

My name is Pamela Sidney. I am a Melbourne based poet& singer.

I am absolutely appalled and alarmed at the wording of this Bill especially Sedition, but other sections as well, which potentially threaten all I hold dear regarding freedom of speech and free association etc.

Like quite a few Australian poets, I write political poetry, and value my right to criticise the government of the day - whether it be via comedy, satire, rhetoric or poetry. I value my human right to take an opposing view.

I am very worried that my creative work will be subject to attention from 'the-powers-that-be', understanding that if I show 'disaffection' towards the government it's policies and individuals within it, I am liable to at least 5 years jail - perhaps longer. (I ask what is the interpretation of 'disaffection' ? - a term I consider loose, therefore to my mind, legally perilous)

To my non-legal mind these laws make void human rights and dignity.

I remember the police state of apartheid South Africa.

One cannot fail to make the comparison, and I am ashamed to be an Australian under this current callous

and punitive government.

I want the right to say: (without risk in public) the invasion of Iraq was illegal and immoral. I want the right to say: I feel compassion and sympathise with ordinary Iraqi citizens, that those citizens have an absolute right to fight off whomever may invade their country.(just as we would here in Australia) I want the right to say: John Howard made Australia a prime target for terrorism, and that I am very angry about that.

I will refrain from a long list, but I am a dissenter and value my right to dissent (in public)' if I please. I have a horror that I may already be self-censoring. If so, that is an insidious intrusion into my creative soul.

I consider the current government reckless in action, reckless with the truth, and currently blatantly manipulating citizens through fear and bullying.
